COMMUNITY PAINT-A-THON PROGRAM

It is not too late to apply for the Paint-A-Thon program.

This program provides the

painting of exterior single-family homes at no cost to those who meet the criteria.

To qualify, homeowners must own and occupy the home and have limited financial resources, and are 60 years of age, or a veteran, or have a permanent disability that hinders them from doing the work themselves. Applications are now available for this community service project by calling Catholic Charities at 847-253-5500 or pick up the form at Schaumburg Township Disability Office. Applications are due June 15th. Homes that have peeling, fading or worn paint, should consider applying. Once a home is determined eligible, the assigned volunteer teams will scrape, prime, and then paint the house on September 12, 2015. The rain date is September 19th.

The Community Paint-A-Thon covers 10 townships - Barrington, Elk Grove, Hanover, Maine, New Trier, Niles, Northfield, Palatine, Schaumburg, and Wheeling.




IMPORTANT BILLS

There are some important bills that you should know.

HB2657 makes several significant changes to the School Code. This legislation will have an impact on the educators at the Illinois School for the Deaf (ISD) as there are changes concerning a provisional educator or career and technical educator endorsement on an educator license with stipulations, a substitute teaching license, a general administrative endorsement and a superintendent endorsement on a Professional Educator License, educator testing, educators trained in other states or countries, professional development activities.

SB220-Amendment #1 - provides partial Jurisdiction B exemption to educators at Illinois School for the Deaf (ISD) and Illinois School for the Visually Impaired (ISVI). It means the applicants who apply for ISD or ISVI teaching positions will just submit their applications to ISD directly instead of Illinois Department of Central Management Services (CMS) (to be graded when they are already licensed and qualified by the Illinois State Board of Education). This will speed up the hiring of the educators for both ISD and ISVI.





INFORMATION ABOUT SUMMER HEAT

Summer is here! There are things you should be aware of and tips to survive the summer heat.

Heat-Related Illness Symptoms & First Aid

Heat Cramps

- ◆ Symptoms: Painful muscle cramps and spasms usually in legs and abdomen; heavy sweating
- ◆ First Aid: Apply firm pressure on cramps or gentle massage; Give sips of water.

Heat Exhaustion

- ◆ Symptoms: Heavy sweating; weakness; cool, pale skin; weak pulse; possible muscle cramps; dizziness; nausea/vomiting; fainting.
- ◆ First Aid: Move person to a cooler or air conditioned area; remove or loosen clothing; apply cool, wet cloth; offer sips of water. If nausea happens, stop water. If vomiting, get immediate help.

Heat Stroke

- ◆ Symptoms: Altered mental state; throbbing headache, confusion, dizziness, nausea; high body temperature (106°F or higher); skin may be hot & dry or victim may be sweating; rapid pulse; possible unconsciousness
- ◆ First Aid: Heat Stroke is a severe medical emergency, so get an emergency medical assistance or take the victim to a hospital; move the victim to a cooler environment or AC room; reduce body temperature with a water mister and fan or sponging; use fan if temperature is below the high 90s; use extreme caution; do NOT give any fluids.

Tips to Survive the Summer Heat

- * Drink plenty of water and juices even if you are not thirsty. Avoid coffee, cola & alcoholic beverages.
- * Avoid heavy food. Eat light foods high in water content, fruits, salads, and soups. Eat fresh foods that do not require you to use oven or stove to prepare.
- * Stay indoors as much as possible and limit exposure to the sun. Limit physical activity or exercising from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. (hottest part of the day).
- * Use air conditioning. Keep lights low or off, keep blinds closed. If you do not have an AC or the power is out, go to any air-conditioned building like library or mall for a few hours.
- * Cool down with cool, wet towels and cool baths/showers.
- * Wear loose, light cotton clothes that cover as much skin as possible to prevent sunburn.
- * Remember to use sunscreen to protect your skin, a hat for your face & eyes, and a good pair of sunglasses to protect eyes from the UV rays.
- * Never leave children, disabled adults, or pets alone in parked vehicles. Temperatures inside a vehicle can reach 140 to 190° F within 30 minutes.
- * Check on family, friends, and neighbors who do not have air conditioning and/or live alone.

Every year, many people are killed or seriously injured by tornadoes and severe thunderstorms despite advance warning. Preparedness along with severe weather watches and warnings, may save your life.

Know the tornado terms:

- ◆ **Tornado Watch:** National Weather Service (NWS) decides that tornadoes are possible in your area. Be alert. Either visit www.weather.gov or check your TV for further details.
- ◆ **Tornado Warning:** NWS determines that a tornado is happening, or is likely to happen within minutes, in a specified area. Warnings show danger to life and property. If you see the threatening skies, only you can make decision to seek safety.

What to do before a tornado:

- ◆ Have a family tornado plan in place. Know where you can take shelter immediately and practice tornado drills at least once a year. Have a place to meet after a disaster.
- ◆ When a tornado watch is issued, make sure your safety supplies are handy. Turn on your TV or radio and stay alert for warnings.
- ◆ Do not waste time opening windows - the tornado will blast window open for you!

What to do during a tornado or the onset of a tornado warning:

- ◆ **House with a basement** - Avoid windows. Get in the basement and under a heavy table or work bench, or cover yourself with a mattress or sleeping bag.
- ◆ **House with no basement, or a dorm, or an apartment** - Avoid windows. Go to the lowest floor, small center room like bathroom or closet, under a stairwell, or in an interior hallway. Cover your head with some kind of thick padding to protect yourself against falling debris.
- ◆ **Office building, hospital, or nursing home** - Go to an enclosed, windowless area in the center of the building. Cover your head. Interior stairwells are good places to take shelter and allow you to get to a lower level quickly. Do not use elevators as you get stuck if power goes off.
- ◆ **Mobile home** - Get out as it is not safe. Go to one of those shelters, or to a nearby permanent structure.
- ◆ **Car or truck** - Vehicles are extremely risky. If the tornado is visible, far away and traffic is light, you may be able to drive out of its path by moving away from the tornado at right angles. If you are caught by extreme winds or flying debris, park the car out of traffic lanes. Stay in the car with the seat belt on. Put your head down below the windows and cover your head with your hands and a blanket, coat, or other cushion. Avoid looking for shelter under bridges.
- ◆ **Open outdoors** - If possible, seek shelter in a sturdy building. If not, lie flat and face-down on low ground, protecting the back of your head with your arms. Stay far away from trees and cars as you can.

What to do after a tornado:

Keep your family together; wait for emergency personnel to arrive for help. Stay away from power lines & puddles with wires in them. Stay out of any heavily damaged houses/buildings as they could collapse at any time. Do not use matches or lighters in case of leaking natural gas or fuel tanks nearby. Stay calm and alert.

GRILLING TIPS

Below are the outdoor grilling tips as the peak months for fire related to outdoor grilling are June & July.

- ◆ Use your grill outside only and place it away from combustible materials like siding, balconies, deck rails, etc.
- ◆ Keep your grill on a level surface.
- ◆ Keep children and pets at least 3 feet away from the grill area.
- ◆ Always check the propane hose for leaks.
- ◆ Open your gas grill before lighting.
- ◆ Clean your grill after each use to remove grease that can start a fire.
- ◆ Keep an eye on your grill. Never leave it unattended when in use.
- ◆ Place coals from your charcoal grill in a metal container once they have cooled completely.
